

From the Principal

We have had a great start to the New Year. I have to say I am very proud of our 2017 Year 12 HSC students and their teachers for the outstanding results. The nineteen Band 6, eight E4, fifty-one Band 5, eight E3 and eightyfive Band 4 were an outstanding result. A number of students were in the top 10 in the State, along with Meagan Davis 99.95 top in the State. ATAR results were impressive; there has been many university early entry offers and job starts as well.

Our school was also included in a list of schools that have better than expected growth in NAPLAN results last year. Well done to our Year 7 and 9 students and the support we received from parents. Last year was the first Year 9 group coming through that has mandatory literacy and numeracy requirements to be eligible for a HSC. Our efforts last year and again this year will be to assist as many students as possible to meet those requirements in Year 9, and support those who require further assistance to meet the requirements at a later time.

Thanks to everyone who has supported the full introduction of the new school uniform. Our students look great. I feel this has contributed to a positive start to the year. We will be seeking students and parents support to maintaining the wearing of uniform throughout the year.

More good news is the reoccupation of the Mathematics section of F Block. There are still a few things to be done however, classes are back in and things are returning to normal. The Library has opened for book



borrowing before school each day but there is a lot of work to go with cleaning and returning books to their correct location on the shelves. The demountable Library is still functioning for class groups, use of computers and printing, Distance Education study space and senior study space.

Welcome Year 7!

Our new Year 7 students have had a fantastic Orientation and Welcome to Bellingen High School. Bellingen High has gained 132 (at last count) new, excited, (and of course a little nervous) faces to our bustling school.

We welcome new students from our local area – including Bellingen, Raleigh, Repton and Orama. We also welcome some new students and their families, who have joined our great community from Victoria, Queensland, Sydney, Baradine, Bonville, Nambucca Heads and Boambee.

This Year 7 group began their journey at Bellingen High School with Orientation Day, which was at the end of last year. This gave our new students the opportunity to become familiar with their new school, meet their new classmates, get to know their teachers and experience some high school taster lessons. the formal schooling process. The Welcome Program was held over the first four days of the new school year. Years 7, 11 and 12 were treated to a traditional Welcome which Ceremony, involved a Welcome to Country, traditional dances and smoking ceremony by Aboriginal members of the community and students. This was a fantastic way



to begin the year and demonstrated Bellingen High School's strong connection to, and celebration of, our Aboriginal culture and heritage. Throughout the following days, students participated in various learning experiences such as music, clay modelling, time capsules, weaving, five senses food games, journaling and relaxation/meditation. The students also had the opportunity to meet and hear the stories of prominent community members and their new Deputy Principal. The students also created a Hands Wall, which will be displayed in the school grounds.

The Welcome Week was a fun and memorable way for our new Year 7's to start their journey at Bellingen High School. The experience allowed them to develop a connection and sense of belonging in their new school environment, their new peers and their new teachers.

I would like to express my deepest gratitude to the staff, support staff, community members and most importantly, the Aboriginal Advisory Group. I have heard so much positive feedback and the smiles on the students' faces are an indication of just how successful the Welcome Week was.

Snapchat....we have a problem

If you have allowed your primary school student or young teen a snapchat account, here's something you need to be aware of.

One of the search functions of Snapchat is providing too much information about their users. If the location services for the app are turned on, a very concerning security problem is revealed.



Snapchat has a very clever user retention strategy behind it. They lured in a whole generation based on the fact that their snaps would disappear after a short amount of time, so it became a second language for teenagers. A large percentage of kids say they use Snapchat because their parents don't. Also, if you turn off location services for snapchat you start to disable some of the photo filters so kids won't turn off location services for Snapchat.

And there lies a BIG personal privacy and security issue that you and your children are not aware of and should be.

Enter a school name or a suburb into the search feature on Snapchat and the app will deliver to you all of posts being made in proximity to the location. It will also suggest other schools (with other Snapchat account holders). Often this list will include the names of account holder, and provides the individual searching locations with the option to add the account holder to their contacts.

This raises two issues.

- 1. It provides evidence that numbers of students are using snapchat in and around school often in defiance of the schools' mobile devices usage policy.
- 2. Complete strangers are able to target your child's Snapchat profile, using the school they attend as a way to find them. This issue is particularly disturbing.

Consider this possible scenario if you are not concerned by this information.

A predator doesn't know the names or other regular locations of children attending any of the schools in the area that they may be, but simply by searching the school name in the Snapchat search feature, they are able to find regular users of Snapchat at these schools that are close to them.

Courtesy of Snapchat they are now able to add the accounts of any child they find, and may now happily follow their snaps, record or screen shot them.....and watch for other locations that appear regularly in a child's Snapchat feed, such as their home or regular place for sporting activity. They can also interact with the child through their account, and become "friends" with them on any other social media account.

What can you do to minimize risk?

- Respect the age restrictions of 13+
- Build trust with your child by explaining why you insist the account be set to private.
- Ensure that Ghost Mode is enabled on the Snap Map, so account holder information is hidden.
- Turn the location services for the app off on the device.
- Regularly review with your child who interacts with their account.
- Ask your child to respect the schools mobile phone policy.

BELLINGEN HIGH SCHOOL UNIFORM

Bellingen High School asks all parents to send their children to school neatly dressed in correct uniform. Every student should take pride in his or her personal appearance and the wearing of school uniform is an important step in developing a good school spirit.

The Bellingen High School uniform has been agreed on following extensive community consultation and is supported by the P&C, Student Representative Council and Staff. It is expected that students will be in full school uniform at all times unless they are involved in an approved activity that does not require the uniform to be worn.

Students who have approval to be out of uniform are required to comply with the dress code that includes being neat and tidy with shirts that have a collar and sleeves. Fully enclosed shoes are to be worn at all times. The following items are unacceptable – ripped clothing, singlets, string shoulder tops as shirts, sleeveless shirts, low cut necklines or armholes, midriff tops, jumpers with hoods and slogan pictures.

The wearing of uniform is school policy at Bellingen High School and has many advantages which outweigh the disadvantages. Its main argument, in a school like Bellingen, is it gives identity to the student body in a school which has students from varying levels of socio-economic backgrounds.

Students are not permitted to participate in extracurricular (non-compulsory) activities such as sporting representation or excursions if they have not made a genuine effort to wear school uniform. In cases of genuine hardship, parents may approach the Deputy Principal for assistance in the provision of a uniform via the Student Assistance Scheme.

Uniform items are available from the school's Front Office (limited sizes/stock) and LOWES Toormina who have a full range.

To encourage uniform wearing we have: -

- 1. A commitment from the staff both encouraging students and acting in a supervisory role.
- 2. P&C support
- 3. A support network with parents
- 4. A supporting statement from the SRC in relation to uniforms.

Footwear:

Establishing and maintaining safe working environments is fundamental to the work of teachers and students. Footwear is an important safety item. Good soles provide a sound grip on the floor preventing accidents from occurring. Footwear can also protect feet from mechanical or chemical damage.





Department of Education policy clearly states that it is mandatory that students carrying out practical activities using chemicals or equipment in schools wear enclosed <u>leather</u> footwear. This includes all Science, Industrial Arts and Home Economics classes. Our commercial stainless steel kitchen is in operation and no student will be allowed in without leather footwear.

Students who attend school with inappropriate footwear (e.g. thongs, crocs, scuffs slipon sandals without a strap, high heels, ugg boots or slippers) may be isolated from practical classes, or sent home to get footwear that is more appropriate. In all cases, it is best for students to have an explanatory note from home <u>AND</u> report to the Deputy Principal's office <u>before</u> school to get a Red Uniform Slip.

The Newsletter is published every second Friday on the school's website with the link emailed to parents who have supplied us with their email information. The newsletter is a valuable part of our home/school communication and includes important dates and information about activities and events at school. We also have our school Facebook page.

Step 2: Investigating the complaint

Senior Officer and Contact Officer will:

- interview both parties
- ✤ seek resolution
- ✤ write report for Principal and recommend action

Step 3: Making a decision

Principal or Senior Officer will:

- decide on action and inform both parties
- inform both parties of right to appeal

Step 4: Appeal

Next most senior officer will:

- review material
- discuss with person appealing
- attempt resolution
- decide on action and inform all parties

Step 5: Further action

Principal or Senior officer will:monitor situation regularly


