

Dear Parent / Caregiver

Re: Parent Meeting in Staff Common Room on the afternoon of Monday, December 7, 2020 from 3.30pm.

I am writing to invite you to attend an information evening regarding the Bellingen High School processes and policies surrounding bullying and unacceptable behaviour in the classroom and playground and the consequences for the same.

As the year has progressed, there has been a small group of Year 7 students who have persisted with poor and anti-social behaviours. These include, but are not limited to:

- Truanting including partial lesson truancy (late arrival)
- Arriving to class late and with food, demanding to be able to eat it
- Swearing at staff and at students (often at students in a threatening or intimidating way in a concerted, persistent manner)
- Failure to follow basic instructions
- Failure to bring basic equipment for lessons
- Failure to comply with consequences for action (detentions)
- A lack of respect shown for people, environment, resources and self as well as a prevailing lack
 of respect for any authority, be it individual or collective
- Evolving and escalating risk taking behaviours

The purpose of our discussion is to outline what steps the school is taking to remediate these behaviours and change culture and ask for your input as to possible solutions and strategies that may work if we can work together for the benefit of the 'greater good' and in particular the positive educational outcomes for your student. It would also be an opportunity for you to be able to review the behaviours that have been prevalent this year in your student's day to day happenings at school – as they appear on our recording system (Sentral) and as per staff input prior to the meeting.

Light refreshments will be served as part of our discussion time. We look forward to your involvement in helping us to seek a solution and way forward from this point into 2021 as we work together for the benefit of many – not just your student.

Hoping to see you on Monday afternoon.

From the Deputy Principal Uniform

The wearing of uniform is school policy at Bellingen High School. School uniform provides students with a sense of connection to the school. In a school like Bellingen, it also gives identity to the student body in a school which has students from varying levels of socio-economic backgrounds.

It is always pleasing to see so many of our students in uniform and we would like to thank all those students and families for making the effort to do this. I would like to remind everyone that Ruggers are not part of our uniform and that shorts and skirts should be an appropriate length. All students are reminded that if they are not in uniform they must meet the dress code set for all students. This means that singlet tops, scoop style shirts, any midriff shirts or shirts displaying alcohol or illegal substances are not acceptable. If students are wearing this to school they will be asked to change into school uniform.

Lowes Toormina will be stocking a unisex style short that caters for a greater range of students than our current blue shorts. These have had positive recommendations as an option from a variety of students especially the girls that tried these.

If students are out of uniform they need to see the Deputy to get a uniform slip in the morning. Students that repeatedly do not follow this process may be placed on detention for not following our school rules and expectations.

Social Media

It has come to our attention that some students particularly in Year 7 are sharing username and passwords for their social media.

You can help protect your child from risky or inappropriate content and activities by teaching your child about internet safety.

You can also talk with your child about:

- managing safety and privacy settings on their phone for example, checking that social media profiles are private and locking the phone with a pin
- not entering personal details like name, address or date of birth into online accounts or forms
- accepting new social media friend requests only from people they know face to face
- checking which apps use location services and switching off unnecessary ones. This
 can ensure that your child isn't showing their location to nearby people that they
 don't know.

CATTLE SECTION

Social Media - Top Tips for Parents

- Talk to children about online privacy issues, making sure they know to never to identify personal information such as their full name, address, age, school and don't ever post photos in school uniform.
- Teach your children to respect people's privacy and don't share anyone else's personal information online without permission.
- Don't tag photos of your children at their school if your accounts are not set to completely private. This is a child safety issue as anyone driving past can search the school on Instagram and see all of the photos that have been tagged at the school, often by parents who have not set their account to private on Instagram. If your account is not completely private, anyone can see your photos of your child, their name, the name of the cat ,where you go on holiday, what your family does on weekends, when birthdays were and other information about your family and your life. Therefore a complete stranger could make up a story that could be very convincing to your child by using the information you have shared in a public forum of more than 500million users.
- If you are going to post anything with a significant fact, check it first.
- Teach your children to understand the importance of passwords, keeping them private and changing regularly.
- Learn how to recognise a scam. If it is too good to be true, it probably is.
- Make sure the apps you allow your kids to use are age appropriate.
- Don't be patronising or insulting to anyone. This kind of behaviour validates bad behaviour in children as they often see it if you are connected to young people on social media.

- Ban devices from the bedroom from as young as possible. Set boundaries around use.
- Share pictures and videos only with consent. And respect the privacy of others.
- Keep your love-life and arguments off social media.
- Stay positive. If you see something you disagree with don't engage.
- Consider the fact that children in the background of photos or videos you take at your child's school may be on
 "no publish" lists. Some children are in protective custody or witness protection and an innocent photo posted
 on social media could be disastrous.
- Teach young people not to say, or repeat anything that they wouldn't say if the person were standing right in front of them.
- Recognise that other people's opinions may be different to their own and that does not give them permission to attack those opinions online.
- Remember that even an emoji can be taken out of context by someone reading it.
- Use your head and your heart and don't let emotion be the only thing driving you to post.
- Make sure you respect classification on games, they are there for a reason.
- Make sure the young people in your care know that under no circumstances they should go and meet up with anyone they meet online. Stranger Danger rules apply because they are now literally on digital steroids and 24x7.

From the PDHPE Faculty PE Uniform 2021

All students must change into appropriate PE uniform for Physical Education lessons and Sport. This is for both personal hygiene and consideration for students who sit near them in lessons later in the day.

Being prepared with appropriate change of uniform forms part of all students' assessment.

Students are required to have the following uniform:

- Yellow polo shirt
- Appropriate footwear
- School shorts
- Hat (essential for sun safety)

Change will be marked as:

2 – Correct PE uniform

1 – Changed

0 – Incomplete/No change

Asthma and Aerosols

Some members of the Bellingen High School community suffer severe allergies to aerosol sprays or perfumes that can act as a trigger to an (often) serious asthma attack, or bring on a severe migraine in a sensitive individual. The allergy can be sufficiently serious to put a student into anaphylactic shock if an aerosol can has been used anywhere in the student's vicinity. This can be a life threatening situation, resulting in the student being transported to hospital in an ambulance.

- Aerosols are banned from school premises, excursions, and sporting events.
- Students are encouraged to follow correct hygiene procedures by applying deodorant at home after showering: a good deodorant will last all day if applied to clean skin before dressing
- Roll-on and stick deodorants are permitted at school

Let's Help to Create an Asthma Friendly school. This means that everyone needs to be aware of their own:

- right to a safe learning environment
- · responsibility for the health and safety of others in their shared spaces

Remember: No student is to use or bring aerosol deodorants or sprays to school. This is NSW Department of Education Policy.

Teachers have been asked to confiscate any aerosol products found at school and bring them to the Deputy Principal. Parents will be informed that the products have been collected from their child and that they can call into the school and collect the product. Further infringements will be dealt with through the discipline system. Thank you for considering the health and safety of others.

BELLINGEN HIGH SCHOOL UNIFORM

Bellingen High School asks all parents to send their children to school neatly dressed in correct uniform. Every student should take pride in their appearance and the wearing of school uniform is an important step in developing a good school spirit.

The Bellingen High School uniform has been agreed on following extensive community consultation and is supported by the P&C, Student Representative Council and Staff. It is expected that students will be in full school uniform at all times unless they are involved in an approved activity that does not require the uniform to be worn.

Students who have approval to be out of uniform are required to comply with the dress code that includes being neat and tidy with shirts that have a collar and sleeves. Fully enclosed shoes are to be worn at all times. The following items are unacceptable – ripped clothing, singlets, string shoulder tops as shirts, sleeveless shirts, low cut necklines or armholes, midriff tops, jumpers with hoods and slogan pictures.

The wearing of uniform is school policy at Bellingen High School. School uniform provides students with a sense of connection to the school. In a school like Bellingen, it also gives identity to the student body in a school which has students from varying levels of socioeconomic backgrounds.

Students are not permitted to participate in extracurricular (non-compulsory) activities such as sporting representation or excursions if they have not made a genuine effort to wear school uniform. Parents can approach the school for assistance in this area if required. Please ring the Front Office to find out more.

To encourage uniform wearing we have: -

- 1. A commitment from the staff both encouraging students and acting in a supervisory role.
- 2. P&C support.
- 3. A support network with parents.
- 4. A supporting statement from the SRC in relation to uniforms.

Parents can purchase and have embroidered cotton shirts for students who have an adverse reaction to the fabrics used in the uniform. Hopefully early in 2021 (reliant on delivery), we will have a sample of hemp shirts for \$30 available which look the same as those from Lowes.
