Knowing that, based on Covid restrictions, we cannot have a subject selection evening. selections will be made. Students have made selections of subjects they wish to look at and will go to immersion classes in Week 3. This will be very exciting for students who will get to see senior work in action in subjects that they may not be aware of content in, because the subject is new to them and has not been studied up until Year 10.

We are very fortunate to boast wonderful community support for our school. One such example is the Rotary Club of Bellingen, who have worked to gain money for a scholarship grant for a worthy student who will be the recipient, studying subjects at Bellingen High School in 2022. This began with a bequest from a member Paul Cowley, who worked tirelessly with students in both the UK and in Australia to optimise their potential in many settings. Rotary were then able to utilise local Council grant submissions to get extra funds through a voting process. 

Deputy News Attendance Matters

Research highlights a clear correlation between student attendance and the achievement of quality academic, socio-economic and health outcomes. This research conducted by the NSW Department of Education tells us that students with an attendance rate below 90% are educationally at risk. Above 95% is our expected student attendance rate.

The infographic below highlights the impact on consistent days off and how your student will be behind in their learning compared to their peers who attend at the expected rate.



Mobile Phones

Students are reminded that their mobile phones need to be **off and away** in class. If they get their phone out without permission from their teacher (there are times they may be used in learning activities), then they are to hand their phone to the teacher for collection from the Front Office at the end of the day. Students who refuse to hand their phone over are then sent to the Deputy Principal and further refusal can result in suspension from school for not following our school rules and expectations.




Library News Library Book - 300 Years Overdue!

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

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From the Science Faculty Ecosystem in a jar

Year 8 are studying ecosystems, which are a biological community of interacting organisms and their physical environment. Students studied Earth's four spheres. the lithosphere, biosphere. hydrosphere and atmosphere, and identified that ecosystems need elements from each sphere. Students used this understanding to design and build a self-contained ecosystem in a jar, complete with rocks and soil to form the lithosphere, and earthworms, decaying wood, mosses, small plants and fungi to form the biosphere. They added water to form the hydrosphere, leaving plenty of air in the jar to form the atmosphere. Students used their creativity to build beautiful ecosystems, which they proudly took home to treasure on a windowsill.

From the HSIE Faculty Riverwatch - Marlawgay Miirlarl (Point Lookout) Field Trip



From the PDHPE Faculty Alert: Asthma and Aerosols

Some members of the Bellingen High School community suffer severe allergies to aerosol sprays or perfumes that can act as a trigger to a (often) serious asthma attack, or bring on a severe migraine in a sensitive individual. The allergy can be sufficiently serious to put a student into anaphylactic shock if an aerosol can has been used anywhere in the student's vicinity. This can be a life-threatening situation, resulting in the student being transported to hospital in an ambulance.

- Aerosols are banned from school premises, excursions, and sporting events.
- Students are encouraged to follow correct hygiene procedures by applying deodorant at home after showering: a good deodorant will last all day if applied to clean skin before dressing.
- Roll-on and stick deodorants are permitted at school.

Let's Help to Create an Asthma Friendly School

This means that everyone needs to be aware of their own:

- right to a safe learning environment
- · responsibility for the health and safety of others in their shared spaces

Remember: No student is to use or bring aerosol deodorants or sprays to school.

Teachers have been asked to confiscate any aerosol products found at school and bring them to the Deputy Principal. Parents will be informed that the products have been collected from their son or daughter and that they can call into the school and collect the product. Further infringements will be dealt with through the discipline system.

Thank you for considering the health and safety of others.
