Darcy Cronin finished his HSC last year and has deferred his uni offers for a year to take up a role in the Australian Defence Force (ADF) Gap Year Program. He is currently in the Air Force stationed in Darwin.

Some Q & A's with Darcy about his experiences:

Q: Why did you decide to do a gap year with the ADF?

I was always planning on a gap

year after school, so I thought why not do something physically challenging, that gives back to the community.

- Q: What is the gap year program like? What have you done so far?
- A: The gap year program provides a unique experience of the defence lifestyle without the long-term commitment. To date, I have completed basic training at Wagga Wagga, employment training at Ipswich and am currently working in Darwin.
- Q: What's the best thing about being in the Air Force?
- A: The best part of being in the Air Force is the opportunity to learn unique things that not many people get to experience. I am qualified with a range of weapons, have been involved in international exercises and have had travel opportunities. The ADF trains you in many life skills such as First Aid and survival training. I have also made some great lifelong friends from all over Australia and overseas.
- Q: What's been the most challenging thing you have had to do so far in the Air Force?
 A: The most challenging thing I've had to do so far in the Air Force is to adapt to a new lifestyle, particularly during the basic training phase. This included working very long days, being disciplined by rank daily, pushed to your physical and mental limits, having your communication with family and friends restricted, and learning how to function whilst being sleep and food deprived. It sounds strange, but as hard as this stage was, it was one of the best experiences I've had as it built resilience, determination, comradeship, and overall character. In saying all that, I was glad it only lasted 12 weeks.

- Q: What advice would you give to someone from Bellingen High who was thinking about applying?
- A: If you're looking for something that is physically and mentally challenging and want to give back to your country, I'd highly recommend it. I would suggest you look throughout the ADF, RAAF, Army, and Navy to find what job role would best suit you. There are endless possibilities to shape your career.

Library News Duolingo Club

Duolingo Club is starting in the Library in Term 4. You may ask, what is Duolingo? A free app for languagelearning where users can practice vocabulary, grammar, pronunciation and listening skills using spaced repetition. Duolingo has 120 million users around the world



Duolingo is one of the best ways to get yourself started in a new

language, not just because it's free, but because there's such a bountiful buffet of languages to choose from! From the most popular language, Spanish, with 31 million learners to Yiddish, Esperanto, Navajo, Zulu, Cantonese, Ukrainian and even dead and fictional languages: Latin, Ancient Greek, Klingon (Star Trek) and High Valyrian (GoT).

When signing up for Duolingo, you set a daily goal. You can choose between 5, 10, 15 or 20 minutes a day. Most of the Duolingo marketing touts "Spending 15 minutes a day learning a new language." So, if you have 387.5 hours of material to get through – and you practice for 15 minutes a day – that's 1,550 days.

So, every Tuesday at lunchtime students can come to the library and log on to a free language lesson, or they can compete with other language learners around the world on Duolingo League. Duolingo Leagues have become one of the biggest and most exciting features in Duolingo. They add a competitive and motivational edge to the language learning experience, which can push language learners even harder to complete daily lessons.

What happens when you get a 365-day streak on Duolingo?





One of the coolest things I discovered was Duolingo's exclusive Streak Society! You get automatically inducted into the club once you get 365 days logged.

- If the activity involves a cost, there will be a **make online payment** button on the form, which will allow you to pay securely, quickly, and easily via credit or debit card after granting permission.

What do you need to do to prepare for the change?

- You do not have to sign up or register with School Bytes or download an app.
- You do need to ensure your email address and contact details are up to date, you don't want to miss critical information being sent to you. Please email or call the school if your email address has recently changed on bellingen-h.school@det.nsw.edu.au or 6655 1315.
- Monitor your email inbox for communications we send to you and respond if required
- Respond to digital correspondence received via email or complete the online digital form and submit.

Attached to this newsletter is a copy of the 2022 HSC Exam Timetable from Wednesday 12th October to Friday 4th November.

Your personal exam timetable

Your personal exam timetable is available from <u>https://studentsonline.nesa.nsw.edu.au/</u> This timetable lists your written exams and where you will sit for them (usually at your school). It also lists any other exams you are entered for, including oral exams for languages, performance exams and submitted works. Details of your performance exams or projects such as title of work or category (supplied by your school) are also available via *Students Online*. If you are undertaking oral or performance exams, we will post the time and venue on *Students Online* later this year. If there are errors or omissions in the exams you are entered for, contact your school immediately to supply us with the correct information. Take special care if you are entered for a VET course that has an HSC exam. If the exam does not appear on your personal timetable, you have not been entered for it. You must be entered separately for the exam if you expect to sit for it.

Preparing for your exams

When preparing for your exams, find out what to expect in the exam room and the exam paper, including where to write your answers. For each course you are studying, know the rules and requirements, and what to expect in each exam.

Information about the HSC exams

Make sure you have read and understand the 2022 Higher School Certificate Rules and Procedures guide. You should have received a guide from your school and can also access it here: <u>http://educationstandards.nsw.edu.au/wps/portal/nesa/11-12/hsc/rules-and-processes</u>

There are serious consequences for:

- cheating in an exam
- disobeying NESA's rules for exam conduct
- not making a serious attempt across a range of questions in each exam.

Any of these offences may result in reduced marks, course cancellation or loss of your HSC.

The exam starting time in the timetable is when reading time begins. Arrive at your exam venue well before the time specified. Further information about your HSC exams is available on *Students Online*.

Disability provisions

If you have a disability that affects reading exam questions or responding to them under exam conditions, your school can submit an application for provisions to help you. If you have not already done so, speak to your school if you think this applies to you.

Exam equipment list

You should write in black pen. Make sure you bring spare pens to each exam. You may also bring a ruler, highlighters, pencils (should be at least 2B) and a sharpener, and a bottle of water in a clear bottle. You can wear your watch to your exams, but once you sit down you will have to take it off and place it in clear view on your desk. Programmable watches, including smart watches, will not be allowed in the exam room.

The following list shows the exams for which you are to bring specific equipment, as there may be some exam questions that require the use of this equipment. If an item is listed as optional, it means that there will be no exam questions for which the item is essential. But you may bring and use it if you wish.

All equipment you bring is subject to inspection on entry. Make sure any equipment you are allowed to bring, such as a calculator, is in good working order because an appeal under misadventure provisions for equipment failure will not be upheld.

What you *cannot* bring into your exam room

- X A mobile phone. Mobile phones are not permitted in an exam room under any circumstances
- X A programmable watch, e.g. a smart watch
- X Any electronic device (except a calculator where permitted). This includes mobile phones or other communication devices, organisers, tablets (e.g. iPads), music players or electronic dictionaries
- X Paper or any printed or written material. You can ask your presiding officer for working paper
- X Print dictionaries, except where permitted in language exams
- X Correction fluid

You are *not* allowed to borrow equipment during exams.
